Or should...female athletes be protected...so they are not disadvantaged unfairly against faster and stronger intersex competitors?

"I've been told that they made the decision to withdraw her before the heats," [Wesley] Botton says. "But politicians forced her to run. They wanted that medal – and she was the first black South African woman to win a world track title. So they threw Caster to the wolves."
