I know that scientists at the <u>Department of Agriculture</u> regularly test the pesticide residues on U.S.-grown crops to ensure what we're eating is safe. I know that companies seeking approval for new genetically modified crops have to test these crops for allergenicity. With the EPA's various pesticide positions, I could read up on the science on these different chemicals and feel confident that it was making sound decisions.

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Until a couple of weeks ago, that is. On March 29, [2017] the EPA decided to reject a proposed ban on chlorpyrifos, a pesticide that's been linked to neurodevelopmental delays in children. ... This decision, announced by new EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt, has caused a confusing situation, since it was the agency's own science that suggested the chemical is not safe.
