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Unfortunately, a large <u>part of the ivermectin "debate"</u> has been severely polluted by <u>fraudulent</u> and <u>poorly</u> <u>done</u> studies. Many of the papers that suggested a possible benefit have been <u>retracted</u> or found to be <u>fundamentally flawed</u>. But the damage has been done. These studies live on as unkillable <u>Zombie Papers</u> that feed the "ivermectin works!" mythology.

And why do they live on? Because ivermectin very quickly became not about science but about ideology and in-group signaling.
