'Glyphosate does not cause cancer and is not responsible for the plaintiff's illness': Bayer snaps Roundup liability losing streak

Bayer has won a trial in a lawsuit brought by a California man who said he developed cancer from exposure to its Roundup weedkiller, ending what had been a five-trial losing streak for the company in trials over similar claims.

The verdict was handed down on [December 22]) by a jury in San Benito County, California Superior Court, Bayer announced. The company said in a statement that the verdict was "consistent with the evidence in this case that Roundup does not cause cancer and is not responsible for the plaintiff's illness."

Around 165,000 claims have been made against the company for personal injuries allegedly caused by Roundup, which Bayer acquired as part of its \$63 billion purchase of U.S. agrochemical company Monsanto in 2018.

Before its <u>recent string of losses</u>, which produced verdicts against the company totaling more than \$2 billion, Bayer had won nine consecutive trials, meaning it has now won 10 of the last 15 trials. Further cases are expected to be tried in the coming year.
